Overview from the Chair

At last! The pandemic has receded (we hope!), the mists have cleared and we are able to meet our friends again, face-to-face. Both our friends nextdoor and our friends in our twin town. As I write, the GTA is putting together a full programme of live events for 2024 – for details, see our website - and there are signs that our townsfolks' twin-town educational and cultural exchange visits are re-starting. GTA members at least will be visiting Freiburg this year: a group will be going over in June to catch up with local friends and to participate in Freiburg's Partner Cities Fair. That's when visitors from 12 different countries plus of course Germany meet each other in friendship and celebration.

What has the GTA been doing over the three years since our last newsletter? Quite a lot, considering the problems! We've maintained our contacts and activities as best we could, supporting exchange visits where possible.

We've continued to direct a considerable effort to involving young people as well as older people. We try to engage everyone in the excitement and romance of twinning, of connecting with Freiburg, Germany and the foreign world generally. With this in mind, we've developed a focus on film. We've run two Filmfeste, with another in the pipeline for 2024 - showing three German films in one day, to combine culture, education, and sheer fun and to appeal to everyone, whatever their age, background or interests. And we've held three Short Film Competitions for Schools – inviting school students in both towns to make a 2-minute film, with some really great results, which you can see on our YouTube channel or via our website. We're now considering promoting a film-making collaboration between a Guildford school and a Freiburg school. We've strengthened our own relationship with our local university, the University of Surrey - which itself is very European-minded and enthusiastic about Freiburg.

We've managed a couple of art exchanges, in 2020 helping Guildford Council donate artworks by two Guildford artists to Freiburg City's art collection to celebrate the city's 900th anniversary, though sadly all Freiburg's planned celebrations had to be cancelled thanks to the coronavirus; in 2022 helping three Guildford artists exhibit their works in Freiburg alongside 6 Freiburg artists. We have plans for a Freiburg return match in 2025.

We've run local profile- and fund-raising events and social events for our members, and kept the fire burning and the flag flying. In future we hope to facilitate the re-starting of educational, musical and sporting exchanges. A major problem for twinning exchanges is the bureaucratic hurdle faced by visitors to the UK since Brexit. We have, with other town twinning associations, been lobbying the UK Government for concessions in relation at least to youth and cultural exchanges, assisted via diplomatic channels by the German Embassy – the latter is very supportive of the twinning initiative and keen on a closer relationship between our two countries.

Very many thanks to all the people who have contributed to our work and its success: as well as the GTA Committee members and their supportive spouses, I thank the many individuals, councillors and civic officers in both Guildford and Freiburg who have supported and helped us. They have helped us maintain a thriving organisation which has the warm friendship, and collaborative relationship of the lovely people of the lovely town of Freiburg.



2021 Public lecture: Germany Today



Julia Gross, the Deputy German Ambassador, gave a fascinating and helpful insight into current German politics and issues. Julia became a good friend to the GTA, as has her successor, now she has moved on to become Ambassador to Hungary.

2022 Public lecture: Caspar David Friedrich -Master of German Romanticism





Eveline Eaton, a Berlin-born highly respected art historian, gave a generously illustrated lecture online, showing Friedrich's artistic development, his place in art history, how his themes related to his life and how he influenced subsequent painters, including those as diverse as Van Gogh and Rothko.

2023 Public lecture: Volker Kutscher - a Translator's Story

Niall Sellar (who is also a Glasgow schoolteacher) is the translator of Volker Kutscher's Gereon Rath crime thriller novels, televised as Babylon Berlin, set in interwar Berlin. Niall spoke about some of the issues facing translators, from the more general one of strategy domestication versus "foreignisation", to specific problems like dialects, idioms, police ranks or food. He told us he aims for "A tentative foreignizing strategy, which seeks to highlight the otherness of the text without compromising its essential accessibility".

A fascinating talk, especially for the translators and teachers in the audience.

We have developed a collaboration with the University of Surrey (which is located in Guildford) whereby we show three German films over one afternoon and evening, each one introduced by an academic specialist from the University. We make our film selection with GTA members plus school and university students in mind as well as the general public - we hope to interest, entertain and educate everyone, and also to help enrich the studies of students of German language and history, and of European history and culture, and of film generally. We have developed the formula of: one 'heritage' film - Germany was an early adopter of film as an artistic medium and a developer of film technique, so there is a wealth to choose from; one meaty historical/thoughtprovoking film; and one film for sheer fun. Some people only view one or two of the films, but some of us happily manage all three.

A Guildford student in Freiburg

Daisy Laing, a student at Surrey University, writes about her year as a teaching assistant in Freiburg and makes recommendations to her successors:

My placement year in Freiburg, Germany, was an unforgettable experience that allowed me to immerse myself in a new culture, gain valuable teaching experience, and explore a beautiful city.

The school

Kepler Gymnasium Freiburg is a prestigious secondary school with a strong emphasis on academic excellence and language learning. It was fascinating to work as an English language assistant in such an environment. My role involved assisting the English teachers in the classroom, helping students improve their language skills, and organizing extracurricular activities related to English culture and language.

Working with the students was a joy. They were eager to learn and incredibly polite. Their enthusiasm for the English language and culture was inspiring, and it made my role as a teaching assistant all the more rewarding. I appreciated the collaborative approach of the school, where teachers and students worked together to create a dynamic learning environment.

The city

One of the standout aspects of my placement year was the city of Freiburg itself. It offers a unique blend of academic opportunities, cultural experiences, and natural beauty. A Freiburg mystery...

Correspondent Steve Millward also drew our attention to another remarkable woman whom he met in Freiburg (see also "I knew Dorothy Elchlepp" on p15), whose motives still remain unknown:

On 25 December 1973, my friend Claire and I went to Dorothy Elchlepp's for Christmas dinner. There we met her other guest, Baroness Manfredi. The Baroness had an incredible story to tell. Having previously been married to a Jewish bookseller she was forced to spy for the SS to protect their children. She later married an Italian count.

John Lucas has written a book about her - *The Baroness: Unmasking Himmler's Most Secret Agent* – which you can order from Amazon. I think she was actually a double agent because Dorothy would have no truck with ex-Nazis. Even after reading the book, I find the Baroness still to be an enigmatic figure. But it confirms she lived in Freiburg and made an application to the reparations office there.

For the uninitiated, that's a radio net. Roger G0SWC & Stella G0SWE are members of the Guildford & District Radio Society (GDRS) and also, under the names Roger Eeles and Stella Whitbourn, members of the GTA. They report now on their amateur radio activities – we hope you can understand what they say....

Following a few years' hiatus the Guildford-Freiburg Radio net has re started. The idea came about way back in Covid times, April 2021 following an email from GDRS member Tim G7JYQ, asking about club radio nets. Stella G0SWE contacted our Freiburg friends Christina Stiefel DL1GEJ and Franz Epple DF7GR who in turn contacted the Freiburg club DK0FR.

GDRS received a favourable response from the Freiburg club via Christina. Hartwig Kauschat DL7BC came back via email with suggestions for frequency and time. As we here in UK are currently on GMT, that means Freiburg time CET is only one hour ahead. The consensus was a weekly contact on a Thursday evening at 17:00 UK and 18:00 CET centred on 40 Metres (7.128MHz). There have now been many successful contacts on the HF (High Frequency) Amateur Radio Bands.

Historically, the Guildford-Freiburg net started back in 1978 almost a full year before the official twinning of Guildford and Freiburg. The original radio net took place on a Thursday lunch time. Unfortunately most of the stalwarts who came up on this earlier net are now SK. (SK = silent key = Amateurs who have passed on).

I for one hope this new radio net will continue for many years to come. This contact has allowed us to make great lasting friendships in Freiburg. The Guildford & District Radio Society also hold regular Zoom contacts with friends in Freiburg DK0FR club.

I knew Dorothy Elchlepp

Dorothy Elchlepp MBE married Paul Elchlepp, a Freiburg pharmacist, in 1936 and went with him to live in Freiburg, where she stayed throughout the Second World War. After the war she devoted herself to building bridges between Germany and Britain. She set up the Anglo-German Club in Freiburg in 1958, and then after a long search chose Guildford as a suitable twin for Freiburg and persuaded the Councils of both towns to establish the twinning in 1979. Just before Christmas 2023 we received an email from a man called Steve Millward, who had spent time in Freiburg, 50 years go. This is his story.

In October 1973, after graduating from Manchester University, my friends Richard Page – now living in Canada, Claire Rowan – who sadly died in 1989, and I, Steve Millward, set off round the world in an old post office van with our initials RSC (Rich, Steve and Claire) painted on the side. We hoped people would think we were from the Royal Shakespeare Company!! I am the one on the left in the first picture

The van was unreliable and always breaking down and sure enough we had problems even before reaching Dover. By a strange coincidence, given what was to come and what has now happened, we stopped at Wadham Stringer in what we thought was Guildford - but may well have been Woking.

On 30 October 1973 we followed a recommendation from a friend and walked into the pharmacy on the main street in Freiburg, looking for a "hugely helpful English lady" who ran the shop with her German husband. Thus we met Dorothy Elchlepp.

Dorothy was the most wonderful person, incredibly kind to us from - literally- the moment we met her. She immediately found Claire a job in a carpet factory and, turning to Rich and me, got on the phone to Brenneisen, the company who were about to install central heating in the shop. She threatened to cancel the contract with them if they didn't give us both jobs!!! So they tamely agreed, taking two entirely inept young men into their sheet metal workshop - neither of whom had done any metalwork before; also Rich didn't speak any German, though I had done 'A' level and could just about manage. She also arranged for me to give English lessons to a friend who lived nearby.

Dorothy was unfailingly kind and generous, often inviting us over for meals. Dorothy lent us some pre-war wooden skis which we took out to Mount Belchen to teach ourselves, not terribly successfully, to ski. But there was a brook at the bottom of the slope so at least we learned how to stop! She was a fiercely patriotic Englishwoman who nevertheless was eager to foster Anglo-German friendship. She told us about her role in seeking a Freiburg-Guildford twinning and was extremely proud of that.

Freiburg became our base for further travelling around Europe and in my case North America. Rich came home in summer 1974 (and later married someone he met in Freiburg), I followed in September - that would have been the last time I saw Dorothy. Claire stayed on and married our neighbour in the squat where we lived - Werner. I am still in touch with him and visited him in Munich a few years ago. As you will have gathered Freiburg - with Dorothy playing a leading role - was a fantastic episode in all our lives.
